- **Apply for Admission to HCC!** Create an account at [www.hcc.edu/apply](http://www.hcc.edu/apply). Complete and submit your application. A decision letter or acceptance packet will be sent to you in the mail. Follow the steps sent to the email address you provided.
- **Apply for Financial Aid.** Create an FSA ID at <https://fsaid.ed.gov>. Next, go to <https://fafsa.ed.gov> to submit your financial aid application. HCC's school code is 002170. If you have already completed a FAFSA, please check on your application by logging in to Online Services at [www.hcc.edu/myhcc](http://www.hcc.edu/myhcc).
- **Take the Placement Test.** HCC uses the College Board Accuplacer test. Go to <https://accuplacer.collegeboard.org/students> for practice tests and study guides. Select the "Classic" version. To schedule your test, contact the Assessment Center at 413.552.2015 or email [assessment@hcc.edu](mailto:assessment@hcc.edu). This is also where you get your Student ID.
- **Register for classes.** Meet with an advisor to develop your educational plan and schedule your classes. A career counselor can help you choose a major or provide career exploration. Walk into the Advising, Career & Transfer Center (ACT) or call 413.552.2722 to schedule your appointment.
- **Log in to Email & Online Services** at [www.hcc.edu/myhcc](http://www.hcc.edu/myhcc). HCC email is used for all communication. Online Services gives you access to e-billing and payment plans, financial aid status, financial aid consent to electronic communication, insurance waiver, registration, advising, DegreeWorks, grades, and student records. 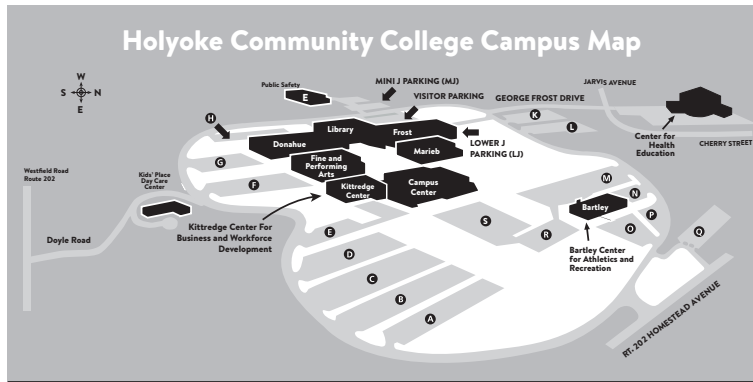

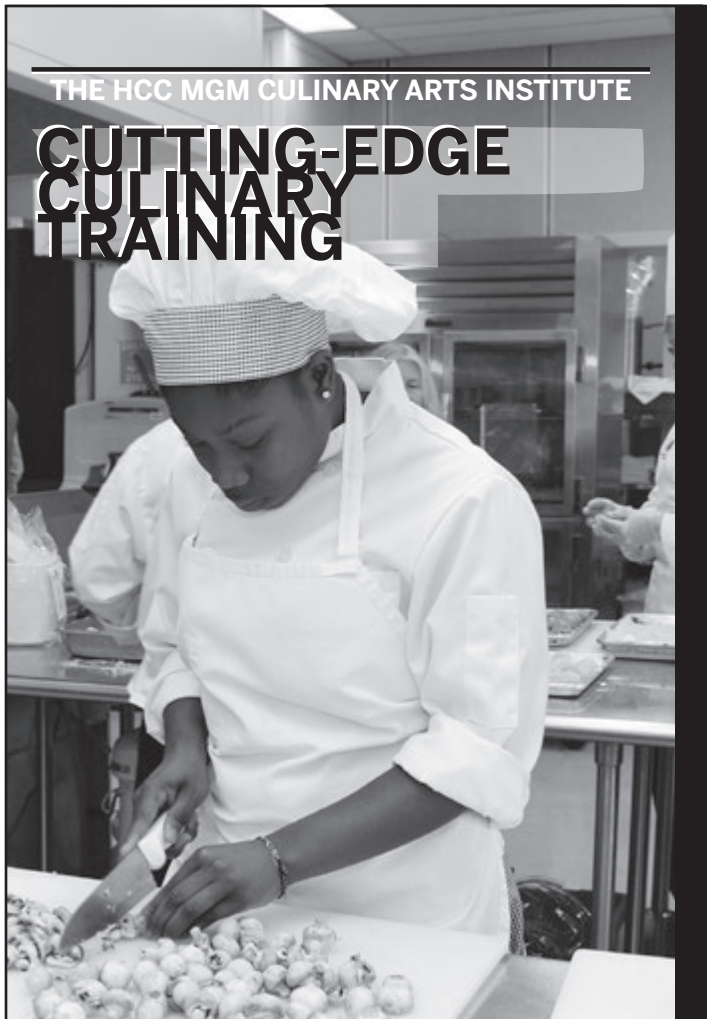

## Credit Course Enrollment Information

### New and Re-Admit Students

Students new to HCC and students who have been away from HCC for one or more semesters must apply for admission at [hcc.edu/apply](http://hcc.edu/apply). All degree or certificate seeking students must take the placement test. HCC uses the College Board's Accuplacer test for placement into math and English. After you have completed the placement test, you will meet with an advisor to develop an educational plan and register for classes.

### Current Students

Registration for current students begins Oct 25. Students may add and drop classes through Jan. 25. If you have earned fewer than 12 college-level credits at HCC or your cumulative GPA is under 2.5, you must obtain a registration code from your advisor in order to register. HCC provides academic advising to all current students. To look up your advisor's name and contact information, login to Online Services at [www.hcc.edu/myhcc](http://www.hcc.edu/myhcc). Students who have earned 12 or more credits at HCC and have a cumulative HCC GPA of 2.5 or higher may register, add and drop classes through Online Services or on campus without a registration code.

### STUDENT ACCOUNT BALANCES AND PAST DUE BILLS

You must pay your bill by the due date listed on p. 9 (based on date of course enrollment) to avoid late fees. A hold will be placed on your account preventing you from enrolling in future semesters and/or obtain an official transcript until the balance is paid in full.

If a balance remains on your account, the balance will be referred to collection agencies where you will be charged legal fees, and collection company fees and costs. Collection costs can be as high as 40 percent of the past due unpaid balance. In addition to collection agencies, unpaid accounts will be referred to the Massachusetts Department of Revenue and reported to the Massachusetts Debt Intercept Program where state and federal payments due to the student, including state tax refunds, will be intercepted and transferred to Holyoke Community College until the student account balance is paid in full.

## Academic Information

### Academic Probation and Dismissal

Academic probation or dismissal for students is determined by the cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) and Quality Hours, as follows:

Cumulative Quality Hours	Cumulative GPA Required
Below 9	No minimum
9 - 30	1.75
Above 30	2.0

**Probation:** The first time a student fails to earn the minimum required GPA as listed above, he/she will be placed on Academic Probation.

**Dismissal:** At the end of two semesters of probation, if the cumulative GPA remains below the minimum standard, the student will be dismissed. However, the student will not be dismissed if, during a probationary semester, he/she earns a GPA of 2.0 or better.

**Readmission:** A student dismissed because of the lack of academic progress may petition for readmission by contacting the Academic Affairs office 413.552.2770.

### Auditing a Course

Auditing a course means attending but not being responsible for written work such as assignments and tests. Audited courses do not earn credits. If a course requires a prerequisite(s), student must provide evidence of meeting the prerequisite(s). To audit a course, complete an Audit Petition at the Student Records office at the time of registration or within the first week of the semester. The cost to audit a course is the same as enrolling for credit.

### Credit by Examination

HCC grants credit for certain Advanced Placement, College-Level Examination Program (CLEP), and DANTES examinations. Call 413.552.2112 for more detail on minimum score requirements and credit awards.

### Dean's List

### Graduation

After your records are reviewed and all requirements have been met, your name will be placed on the graduation list. Congratulations!

### Incomplete Grade

The grade of "I" is given to a student who for good reason (e.g., illness) is unable to complete a major part of the work in a course. It may also be given at mid-semester indicating that work has not been completed. The student has until mid-semester to complete work for courses **other than those that serve as a prerequisite for another course**. Unless waived, prerequisite course requirements must be completed before the first day of the following semester/ Intersession. A grade of "F" and 0.00 grade points will be recorded for work not completed as required.

### Prerequisites

When enrolling for a course with a prerequisite not taken at HCC, students will be responsible for presenting a college transcript which documents that the prerequisite has been met.

### Repeated Courses

Students may repeat courses at HCC in an attempt to earn credit or improve their Grade Point Average. Credit may not be earned twice for a repeated course. All grades, including those in repeated courses, will appear on transcripts. The most recent grade will be included in the student's GPA calculation. The previously recorded grade will be excluded from the GPA, but will still appear on the student transcript. **Financial aid can only pay for one repeat of a previously passed course.** This repeat policy applies even if the student did not receive financial aid when enrolled in the course in the past.

### Transferring Credit Into HCC

The college accepts transfer credit from other regionally accredited institutions of higher learning for courses which may be applied to the student's declared program of study if the courses are similar in content to those offered here. When transfer credit is awarded, the grades earned are not averaged into the student's Holyoke Community College GPA. Credit is granted for courses carrying a grade of C- or better, regardless of the cumulative GPA at the previous institution. The college also grants credit for military courses which meet guidelines issued by the American Council on Education (ACE). For foreign transcripts, the college will provide the student with a list of agencies that evaluate foreign credentials for a fee; the credit award is based on the evaluation which the college receives directly from the agency and also on the applicability of the course work to the student's program. The limit of transfer credit from all sources, including CLEP, is in accordance with the college's 30-credit residency requirement. However, students may request a waiver of this requirement. Waivers are granted on a case-by-case basis by the Vice President for Academic Affairs. Waivers are requested by submitting a Request for Exception to Graduation

Requirement form to the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs.

### Third Party Billing (Company-Agency Payments)

Third party registrations should be submitted in person at Student Account Services located in Frost 201. HCC requires an original letter from the company or agency on their official letterhead including student full name, last 4-digits of the Social Security Number, HCC Student Identification Number, course(s), total or maximum amount being paid by the company or agency, and third party contact information. If you, the student, expect the bill to be partially or fully paid by a third party agency or company, and/or a private scholarship, you must still make payment arrangements with the Student Accounts Office by the due date of your bill. **HON 206 Honors Colloquium****6 Credits**

This is a class about nothing. All semester long we will study nothing and talk to each other about nothing. As Shakespeare noted, we will make much ado about nothing. Nought, nada, nicht, rien, zip, zero. Zero? Is zero an empty hole or a complete whole? Zero is actually something, and some people claim that nothing is actually something, even that something can't exist without nothing. "Nothing comes from nothing," says King Lear, but he wasn't talking about the laws of conservation of mass and energy. In Seinfeld, nothing can be everything, just as infinity can be more than everything and almost nothing. You might whisper sweet nothings in your lover's ear, but does it mean anything? Is nothing "no-thing" or could it be "no not-thing," like an idea? Shakespeare could use double negatives to compound negativity but, in our post-Newtonian age we get confused when someone says, "we ain't got no bananas." Is it possible to have less than zero? Seems like "a tale told by an idiot . . . signifying nothing," but Pascal, who was no fool, claimed that people are nothing compared to the infinite. What would Alice or Humpty Dumpty have to say about nothing? What would Plato or Sartre say? What would Buddha do? How now about the Tao?

Think nothing of it. There's nothing to it, really. So, let's get nothing right!

We will read a variety of texts—from Orange is the New Black to poetry written by incarcerated women, to the novels *The Handmaid's Tale* and *Their Eyes Were Watching God* to the play *Getting Out* --to discover what misconceptions we share about gender in our society and how it imprisons women—literally, emotionally and spiritually. In each of the stories and poems we read, we will also consider the impact of the writer's voice on society and how having a voice and being heard helps women

find their own personal freedom, whatever it may be. This course will also feature a service-learning project with a community-based organization called Voices From Inside that is dedicated to illuminating the experiences of incarcerated women.

**LC 105 Good Planets (& People) are Hard to Find: Choices and Challenges for the Environment 6 Credits**

Within this course we will explore the environmental crisis through the twin disciplines of ecological economics and environmental ethics. This class specifically addresses the capitalist system and its impact upon the environment by paying particular attention to the limits to economic growth in relation to environmental sustainability. We will investigate the following questions: Does the Earth exist for the benefit of humanity? Do humans have any ethical obligations with respect to the natural world? Do we have the right to take all the Earth's resources for our own use? Can we place a monetary value on clean water, forests and clean air? Do animals and plants have legal standing? **LC 107 She Persisted: Exploring Women's Lives Through History and Acting 6 Credits**

Women's marches of 2017. Second Wave feminism. Rosie the Riveter. Surviving the Great Depression. The fight for the vote. Triangle Factory Fire. Anti-lynching campaigns. Slavery. Native American resistance. Throughout American History, women have persisted by negotiating the often oppressive political, social, economic, and cultural forces that shape their lives. Cli-Fi: Stories and Science of the Coming Climate Apocalypse is a Learning Community combining English 102 and ESC 120 (an E 4-hour credit science lab course).

Cli-fi is a new sub-genre of science fiction that deals explicitly with the current climate change catastrophe that, while often grim, can offer hope for the future. We'll read a variety of cli-fi short stories from I'm With the Bears: Short Stories from a Damaged Planet, edited by Mark Martin; a major novel of the subgenre, The Windup Girl, by Paolo Bacigalupi; and, of course, a wide range of poetry, from the Romantics to the present day. Classroom studies will be augmented by guest speakers, films, and frequent field trips to museums and important local geological sites that can help us understand the nature of climate and climate change on Earth. Our Cli-Fi Learning Community will also explore the science behind climate change through a critical reading of the popular Earth science college text, Essentials of Geology, by Frederick Lutgens and Edward Tarbuck.

A journey can be physical, metaphysical, or metaphorical. This learning community will be a kind of journey itself. It will co-enroll students from Tangshan University in China and students from HCC and it will be co-taught by professors from both institutions. The course will include material both from China (in English) and material from western cultures. HCC students will meet in a classroom for 3 hours per week and the rest of the class will be conducted online. You will have a chance to work with Chinese students (who speak English) and to learn about the idea of Journey in their culture, including in music, art, and calligraphy. We will take some small journeys locally and the class will include literature, philosophy, film, and an online game that we will play with our Chinese partners. **LC 203 Tainos, Creoles and Boricuas: Caribbean Identities in History and Literature 6 Credits**

Puerto Rico is often referred to as La Isla del Encanto, or the Land of Enchantment, for its natural beauty and popularity as a vacation spot. Furthermore, this reputation as a carefree zone of sun, sand, and sea extends to the entire Caribbean region. However, behind this fantasy, lies a far more complex history of indigenous societies, contact, colonialism, slavery, plantation systems, and migrations that gave birth to the modern Caribbean. In this Learning Community, we will use the lens of history and literature to explore the legacies of colonialism and its effects on current circumstances of the Caribbean region. Through the analysis of historical documents as well as literary texts, students will examine questions of race, ethnicity, gender, class, and religion within the dynamic developments in the Caribbean. Historical documents will provide the necessary framework to understand both past changes and current circumstances in the Caribbean region. Literary texts will offer ways to question the past and historical representations, address the gaps in the colonial archive, and explore cultural expressions from various groups of people.

**LC 204 Keeping Up with the Times: Global Social(ist) Change in the 21st Century (Honors) 6 Credits**

From a long historical perspective, the pace of social change has accelerated. The transition from the Agricultural to the Industrial Revolution, for example, took ten thousand years, give or take a millennium, while that from the Industrial to the Computer Revolution transpired in little more than two centuries. Each of these revolutions in the material conditions of human existence has had profound implications for human sociability. In contemporary society, information, in the form of digital media, mass digital cultures, securitization regimes, and the communicative powers of the internet, is increasingly a site of ongoing conflict where both freedoms and new servilities abound. Information is, then, a significant source of exploitation and liberation. From cybercrime to cyberwar, with hacktivists from Anonymous to Wikileaks to the Panama Papers, from terms of service agreements to the great firewall in China, information politics now resides at the core of 21st century life. Please join us in this Honors Learning Community course as we investigate how the rapid social changes we have witnessed over the past twenty years, especially in information technology, raise crucial questions concerning whether human beings can control the social forces of change they have unleashed, directing them to their own needs and those of their environment, or whether we will perhaps be destroyed by those very forces?

**LC 205 HON: The Immigrant City 4 Credits**

A history of American cities in the industrial era, this course will focus especially on the city of Holyoke as a site of industrialization, immigration, urban development, and deindustrialization. 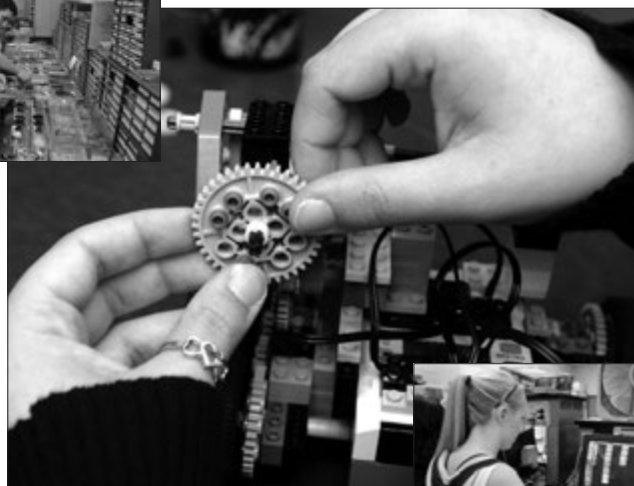
